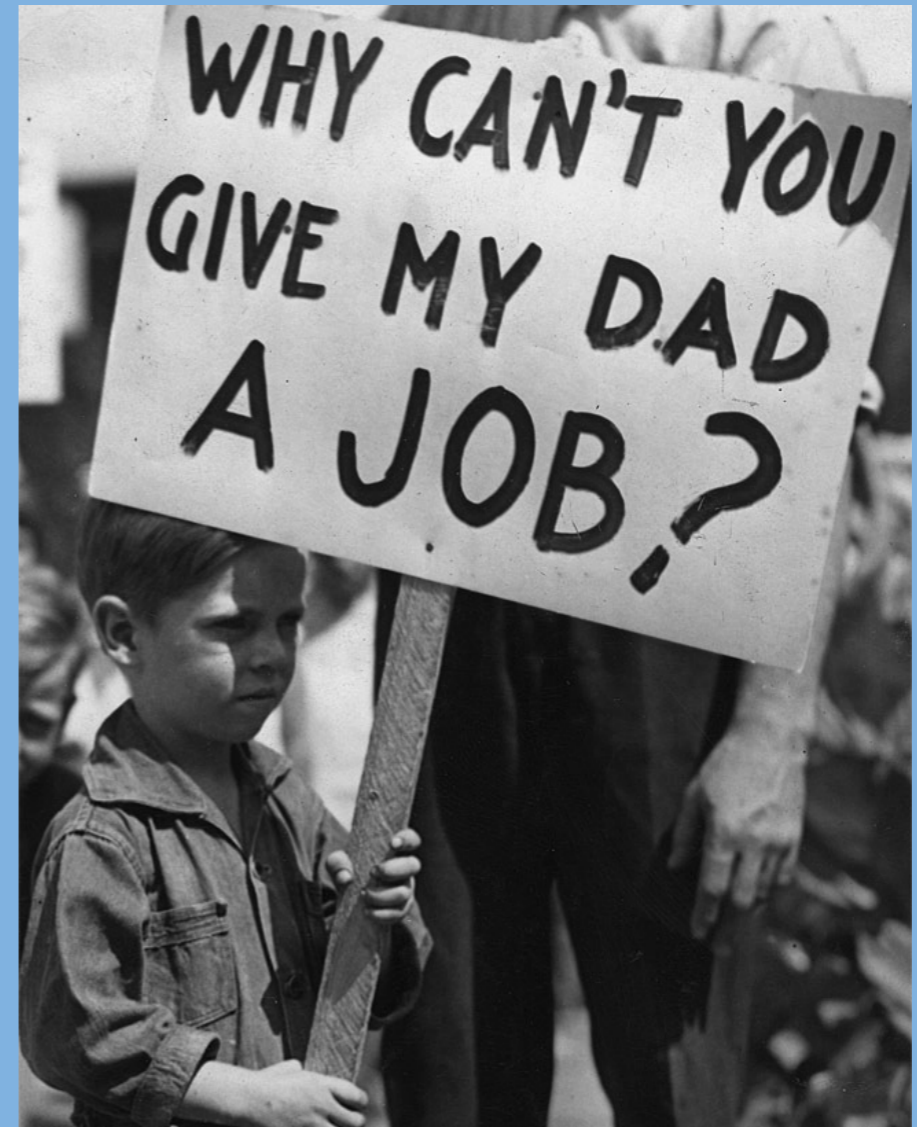

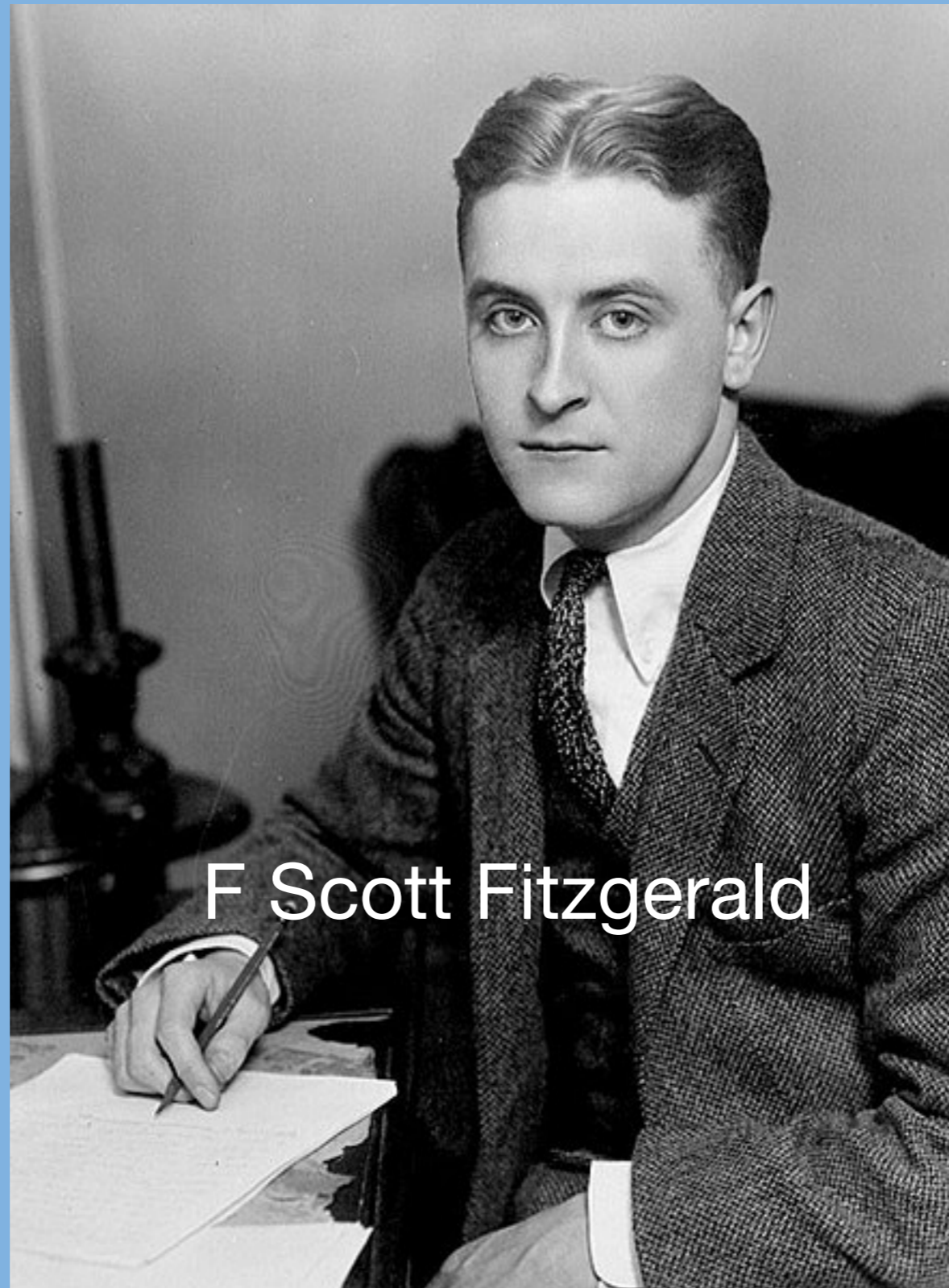

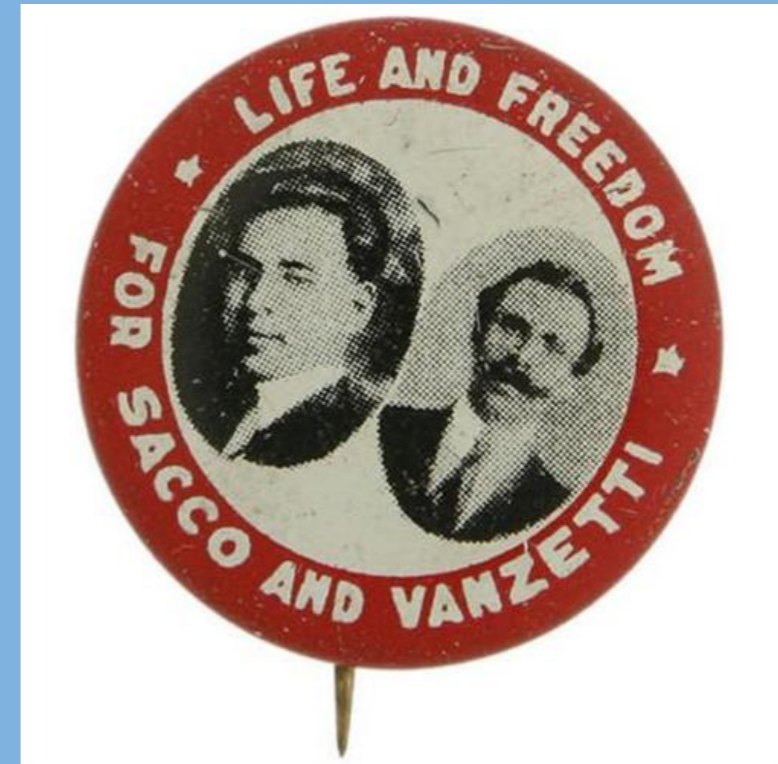

SACCO-VANZETTI TO DIE!

Date of Execution Set for Thursday, August 11th

FEDERAL LYNCHING OF SACCO AND VANZETTI MEANS DEATH OF RESPECT FOR ALL CAPITALIST INSTITUTIONS

HERE IS SOME OF THE STARTLING EVIDENCE WHICH THAYER AND GOV. FULLER SAYS IS NOT SUFFICIENT

Execution of Sacco and Vanzetti is Nothing More Nor Less Than An Old Time Lynching of Innocent Men Without a Trial, for Their So-called "Trial" Was Nothing But a Grim Farce of Perverted Institutions.

Mobs Are Not Always Made up of Working Stiffs
United States Circuit Judge George W. Anderson, in haranguing on his own campus for some of the departed in Boston, following the war, when Attorney General Palmer was head honcho, gave this definition of a mob: "A mob is a mob whether made up of government officials, acting on the instructions from the Department of Justice or of criminals and hangers on of the victims' classes."

Therefore the judicial murder of Sacco and Vanzetti, amounts, the magnitude of a federal lynching of two innocent men, at the hands of a mob of government officials.

Department of Justice Agents Swear to Part They Played in the Conspiracy to get Rid of Sacco and Vanzetti, but Both Governor Fuller and Judge Thayer Hold the Evidence is Insufficient to Grant a New Trial.

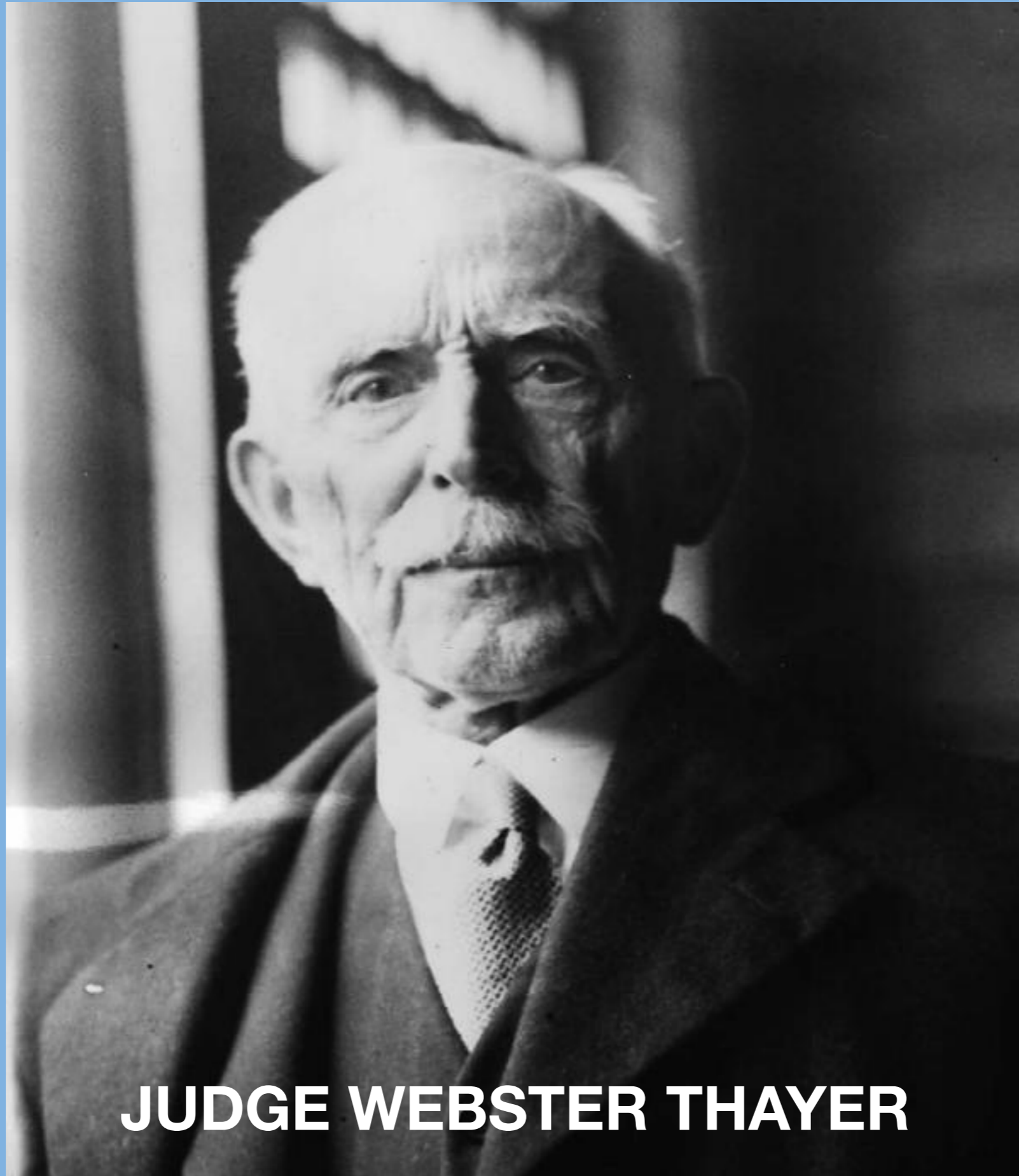
Affidavit of Lawrence Letherman
Former head agent of the Department of Justice in Boston, Mass. My name is Lawrence Letherman. I live in Middle and am in the employ of the Boston Trust Company. I was in the Federal service for 26 years; first in the railway mail service for 5 years, then as post office inspector for 16 years, then three years as local agent of the Department of Justice in Boston in charge of the Bureau of Investigation. I began the last named duties in September, 1921. While I was postoffice inspector, I was connected with the investigation of the Sacco and Vanzetti case.

JUDGE WEBSTER THAYER

"This man, although he may not actually have committed the crime attributed to him," Judge Thayer said, "is nevertheless morally culpable, because he is the enemy of our existing institutions . . . the defendant's ideals are cognate with crime."

Neither had a criminal background

Both had alibis

They had none of the money and made no large purchases

Several other robberies had occurred and Sacco and Vanzetti had alibis for the others

The judge referred to the defendants as “Anarchist bastards”

The judge allowed questioning about Sacco and Vanzetti going to Mexico to avoid the draft and later brought up to the jury how they themselves had done their duty to their country

Refused a retrial even though new evidence was brought forth

Told the jury to “do their patriotic duty” before deliberations

The prosecution withheld evidence that would have been favorable to the defense

Department of Justice believed they were innocent but collaborated in the trial

Several witnesses claimed Sacco and Vanzetti were there but immediately after could not identify them, but a year later they identified them in court

Dozens of witnesses identified Sacco and Vanzetti not being at the crime scene

Celestino Madeiros admitted to the crime

Prohibition (1920-1933)





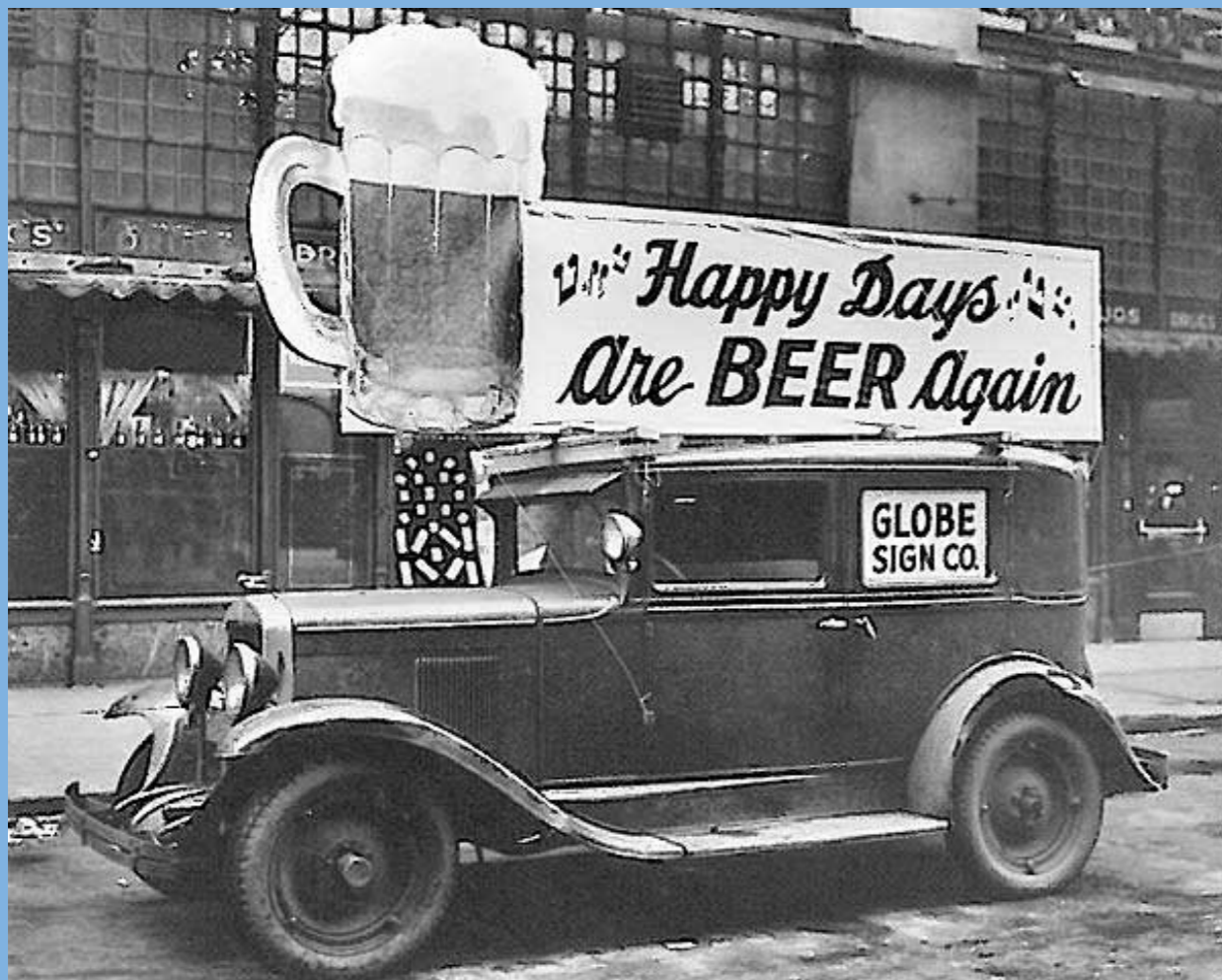

PROHIBITION ENDS AT LAST!

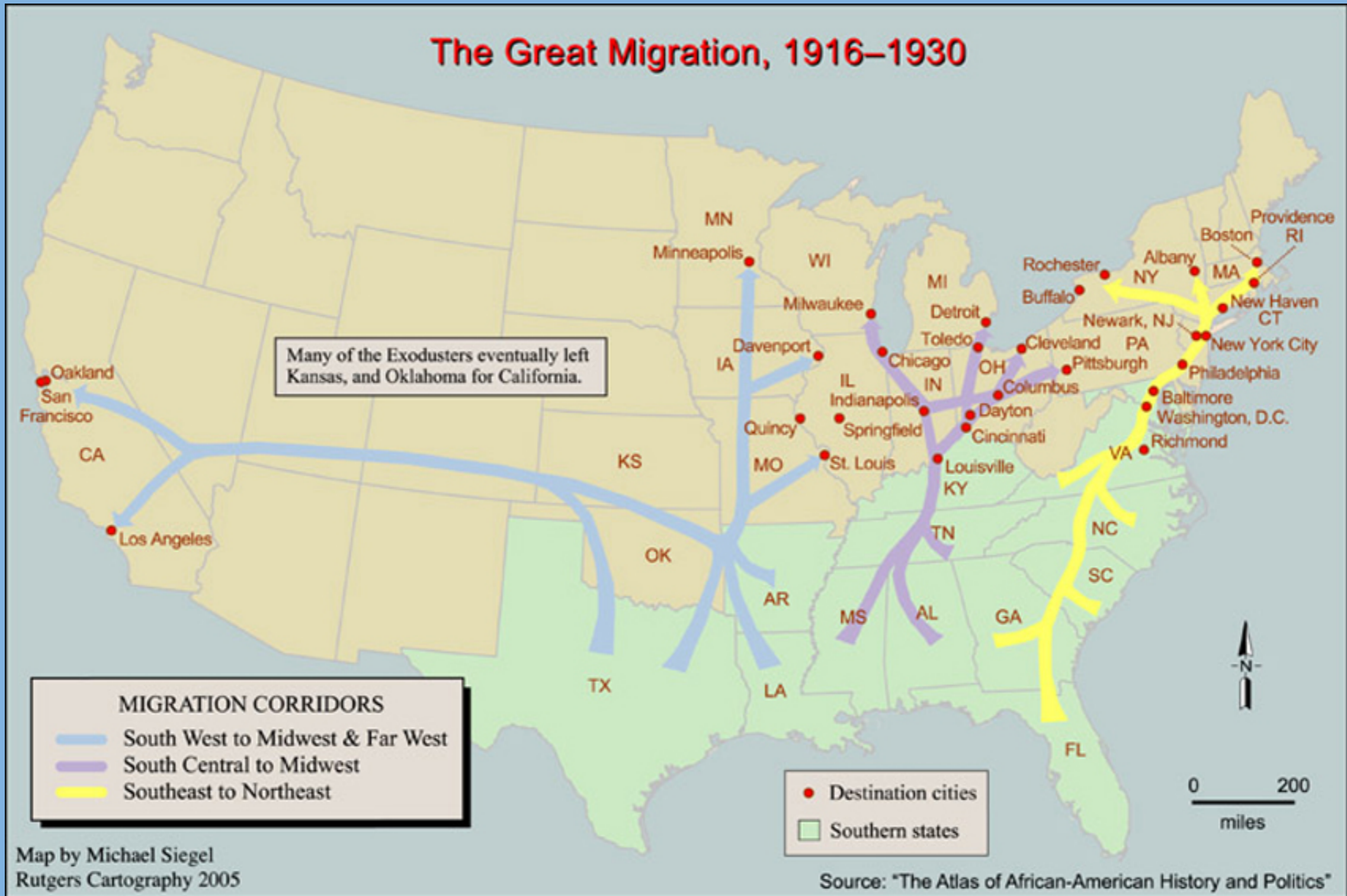
